Dear New Westminster School Board

On behalf of the BC Care Providers Association (BCCPA), I am writing to you about an opportunity that our members have identified for students in New Westminster.

With Canada's aging population, employment in the health care sector is expected to increase by an average of 2.3% by 2025, with Care Aide / Health Care Assistant positions ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in priority health professions.

WorkBC projects that there will be 18,650 job openings for health care aides over the next ten years (2017-2027), 60% of which will be new jobs due to economic growth. More immediately, the BC Ministry of Health has identified a need for an increase of about 1,500 full time equivalents (FTEs) in the long term care sector over the next 3 years, including 900 FTE additional Health Care Assistants.

In order to meet the demand for these workers, BCCPA members have identified the need to begin to significantly increase the number of young workers employed in our sector. Unfortunately, few vocational programs currently exist to allow high school students to begin a rewarding career as a Health Care Aide.

While many vocational programs are available for career orientation students, many of these fields are traditionally male-dominated, and may be perceived by students as unwelcoming for women. Furthermore, many of these occupations are most suitable for individuals who are technically minded. Underrepresented among dual credit programs are fields that are female-dominated, as well as industries that are suitable for those who are naturally compassionate, socially-skilled and community minded.

The BCCPA considers this to be a significant oversight given the many benefits of working as a Health Care Aide. The Health Employers Association of BC reports that an experienced Health Care Aide can earn an average of \$33 per hour, including wages and benefits, and unlike many low-skill careers, occupations in the health care sector are considered by most experts to be stable occupations with a low-risk of automation.

This is also a rewarding career for those that are social orientated and compassionate. Dual credit programs are instrumental in attracting compassionate workers into this important sector; the BCCPA's 2016 winner of our *Care Providers of the Year Award*, Tasia Warren, is a graduate of a dual credit program. Warren has publicly attributed her success in this field to her opportunity to participate in a dual credit program offered through Okanagan College.

The BCCPA urges you to consider expanding your dual-credit program offerings to include Health Care Assistants. This would allow your career-orientation students to enter into rewarding, secure, high-demand jobs with as little as seven months of education and training.

Re: 813 – 823 Carnarvon Street, New Westminster, BC

The applicant proposes to construct two buildings at 813-823 Carnarvon Street. One building will have 5,040 square feet (468.23 square metres) of commercial space at grade facing Carnarvon Street and up to a 32-storey market condominium tower with 204 residential units. The other building will be an eight storey secured non-market housing project with up to 66 residential units. The non-market housing project would be constructed for the Performing Arts Lodges (PAL) a non-profit, federally registered charity that provides veterans of the performing arts industry with affordable housing. The total project has a proposed floor space ratio of 8.53.

This project is scheduled for a Public Hearing on March 5, 2018.

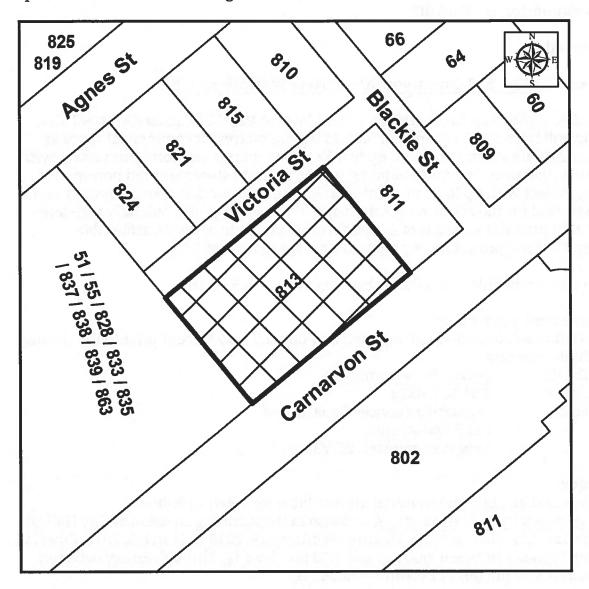

Dear Ms. Manders & Belinda

Am sorry to hear that the Board is in meetings on that date and Belinda will be at a class at SFU, thus unable to assist us in the study on Sat., March 3. Over the course of the next month, I encourage one or more of the Trustees or School Administrators to take a half hour walk and look at the inconsistencies of the crosswalk countdowns at various intersections. They may want to walk with a senior who uses a walker or cane or even with a small child or two to see how easy it is for them to walk in a timely manner.

We hope that they will be able to assist in some form as it is an important issue for parents and students as well as educators. Accidents at intersections can also happen to students as was the case with an 11 year old boy on the morning of Mon., June 7, 2010 who died going to Glenbrook Middle School.

Over the next 2 - 3 months, we will be looking for information and input from various groups that can be passed onto the City's Transportation Dept. We would like to hear from: seniors, with walking challenges, parents with very young children (to age 5), young and older students and other groups. Virtually everyone walks, although when it comes to transportation planning, in most cases, there are very few who speak up for walking except in relation to people who drive or own vehicles or ride bicycles.

Since 1994, there have been a number of changes in population, traffic volume, inclusion, aging and schooling since guidelines in the PCCM for BC were last updated. We think it is time for adding additional elements of safety to this Manual for all walkers, especially at intersections with pedestrian controlled crosswalks.

Again, thank you Ms. Manders for responding from the NW School Trustees and Belinda from the NW SD office.

Dear Mr. Gifford, Belinda & Karon

Each of you (or members of the School Board, School District or PAC's) are invited to participate in a Pedestrian Crosswalk Countdown Study on Sat., March 3, 2018 between 9 and noon. We are looking for 7 teams of 2 - 4 people to check all the present pedestrian crosswalk countdowns in the City. We are looking for people in this "Walk the Walk" study so that New Westminster can develop pedestrian friendly controlled crosswalk guidelines across the City, and perhaps, it will be a basis for provincial guidelines.

The information from this study will be forwarded to the City's Transportation Dep't and they (Ms. Lisa Leblanc, Manager of Transportation and Mr. Kanny Chow, Transportation Engineer) have indicated that they will develop guidelines and implement them at all pedestrian crosswalk controlled intersections within the City by the end of this year.

Our City of New West Master Transportation Plan 2015 stated that walking is one of the top three key components. Another factor is safety. Unfortunately, when it comes to crossing the street at an intersection, at this time, pedestrian countdown times are inconsistent for width of the street, which impinges on people

wanting to walk as well as to their safety.

Research has found that the province of BC has different walking speed guidelines (1.2 m/sec. [4 ft/sec.]) compared with the US (0.91 m/sec [3 ft/sec.]) The Pedestrian Crossing Control Manual for BC 2nd Edition guidelines have not been updated since April 1994. PCCM-BC 1994 does not take into consideration three categories: 1.) the general slower speeds of adults; 2.) seniors 65+ yrs.; and 3.) those who people who use canes and walkers. Another sub-category to consider is pre-school children who, as a group, must cross streets to go to parks for recreation. Little legs do not get across the street as a group very fast.

Let us set a BC example for a walkable city in a safe environment for all age groups and for those who may require mobility aids. With your participation, our City can develop appropriate pedestrian crosswalk control guidelines in this UN declared "Decade of Action for Road Safety".

I look forward to hearing from you.

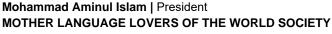
On behalf of our organization, I would like to invite you to attend the upcoming event . We will be delighted if you please attend the event. Please let me know your availability.

#### Q. Does the 2018/19 school calendar meet the School Act minimum hours of instruction?

A. Yes, our instructional hours actually exceed the minimum requirement for our elementary, middle and secondary students.

#### Q. Are any of the non-instructional days or shortened days considered as hours of instruction?

A. No, our non-instructional days (ie. professional development days and curriculum implementation day) are excluded from the calculation towards instructional hours.

# Q. I noticed this year there are (2) days on the proposed calendar listed as "collaboration days – shortened period." Why the change from past years?

A. Recently, the Ministry of Education announced an additional 5 hours on non-instructional time was to be added to the 2018-19 calendar. Boards of Education are required to schedule this additional 5 hours for teachers to participate in discussions and activities that develop evidence-based approaches to curriculum implementation. SD 40 has divided the 5 hours into two periods over the school year and these will be district-wide shortened days with an early dismissal for our students.

A Bylaw of THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 40 (NEW WESTMINSTER) (called the "Board") to adopt the Amended Annual Budget of the Board for the fiscal year 2017/2018 pursuant to section 113 of the *School Act*, R.S.B.C., 1996, c. 412 as amended from time to time (called the "*Act*").
