

What was new in 2017/2018?

Increase in Grad Coach role from .25 to .50 at NWSS

- Academic support, advocacy and liaising
- Academic Action Plans based on individual student needs
- Focus groups directed the role for 2017/2018

(peer tutoring program, cultural field trips, gatherings, leadership opportunities)

What was learned?

Community building among students is essential

Collaboration between Graduation Coach and Aboriginal Youth Worker is key

Working as a team with counsellors, teachers, parents, and administration is working

Advising classroom teachers on individual student needs is working


