



SOURCE COUNTRIES (SEP 2019)





How did you get into modeling?


I was quite tall and started modelling in Japan. "When I turned 16, I flew to Canada for a study abroad program ... and got really involved in the international modeling industry.



Background:

Board Authority Authorized Courses:

- are courses developed by a teacher or teachers in a specific school district that meets the needs, interests and passions of students
- are a way to provide flexibility and choice for students and acknowledge specific learning needs
- are a way to promote engagement in learning to support student success
- follow the Board Authority Authorized (BAA) Courses Requirements and Procedures Guidebook (updated 2018) https://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/education/kindergarten-to-grade-12/support/baa_requirements.pdf
- are Grade 10-12 elective courses that provide credits toward graduation requirements in the 2018 Graduation Program
- cannot be used toward the Adult Graduation Program and do not have pre-requisites;
- cannot significantly overlap any current Ministry of Education course at the Grade 10, 11 and 12 level

Secondary teachers are provided with the BAA guidelines and procedures every September and may submit a BAA course for Board approval in early November. The creation of BAA courses is optional. The number of BAA course submissions varies from year to year.

For the 2021-2022 school year, there have been no BAA course submissions.

Update on BAA Courses Approved for the 2020-2021 School Year:

Course: BAA Applications for Learning

Applications for Learning is designed to provide students with a framework to develop the skills needed to succeed at school and in the community. Developing communication, social, executive functioning and self-regulation skills promotes student independence in all settings. The course is also designed to promote student thinking and reflection with respect to personal strengths, stretches, history, and personal preferences. Students with diverse learning needs often have difficulty transitioning into secondary courses. It is critical to help them understand their own learner profile and to support the development of strategies and skills to support their overall success at school. Applications for Learning strives to provide students with the opportunity to fully understand how to succeed in all learning and community environments.

Course: BAA Self-Efficacy

Self-efficacy is an individual's belief in their ability to be successful. This course is designed to allow students to demonstrate their self-efficacy through overcoming their own social, emotional and/or behavioural barriers to learning. Learning standards for the course are grouped under social-emotional learning themes: self-awareness and management, social awareness and interactions, and responsibility and decision-making. By exposing students to diverse situations and interactions, students will begin to develop personal values. Students will be exposed to strategies and skills to aid them in communication, interpersonal relations, and conflict management while taking responsibility for their decision-making and problem solving.

Course: BAA Volleyball Skills

Volleyball Skills is designed to engage and educate students about the sport of volleyball. Sport specific instruction and player development about skills such as serving, passing, setting, attacking, blocking and defense, for example, will be taught in the volleyball course. The course will focus on the fundamental and technical skills of volleyball, as well as the strategies and tactics used during match play. Students will learn specific offensive setups and defensive strategies used in a volleyball match. Students will be offered the opportunities to lead, officiate and participate in a positive, inclusive learning environment.

				Volleyball Skills was scheduled as a Z-Block class and all students in the class would be from different cohorts. This would require physical distancing and masks at all times. Maintaining this during skill development and game play would be a safety concern.

Course: BAA Laboratory Technology

Laboratory Technology 12 is designed to develop in-depth laboratory management skills and techniques for independent, self-directed students. Students will focus on competencies that allow them to improve their communication, management and organizational skills in a practical, real-world type setting. Students will learn and utilize science safety procedures; demonstrate proper laboratory techniques and equipment usage; and prepare and evaluate laboratory demonstrations and experiments for classroom use.

The Chemistry 11 class was scheduled as a day 1, day 2 remote learning rotation. This course delivery model is not ideal for a student doing the Laboratory Technician 12 course, as it is meant to be 100% hands on and face- to-face on a daily basis.
