# **Career Programs**

#### **Careers Curriculum**

- 2 required courses delivered in Grade 10 and 12; Career-Life Exploration (CLE) & Career-Life Connections (CLC)
- Optional Work Experience (WEX) courses in grade 12

#### **Purpose**

- To help students bridge the transition from world of school to world of work
- To prepare students to be effective citizens and life-long learners
- To provide knowledge and develop personal and social skills for future career-life choices

# Career Programs: CLE and CLC courses

#### Requirements

CLE (grade 10) requires daily class attendance, regular portfolio work, establishing a mentor, and interactive discussions, often with a guest speaker.

CLC (grade 12) requires evidence of 30+ hours of career-exploration activity, a Capstone project which highlights the students learning journey, and large and/or small group lessons on relevant transition topics.

#### **Community Connections**

Mentorship is the most significant way we connect the students with their broader community. We also invite speakers from WorkSafe, anti-discrimination groups, financial literacy experts, and various career experiences.

#### **COVID Adaptations**

CLE and CLC were both run virtually this year due to timetabling and cohort restrictions

# Career Programs: Work Experience

#### Requirements

- Preplacement interviews to determine readiness/interest area
- 20 days of course work to include work safety, work place orientation and ministry curriculum
- Student Training Plan date of on-site safety training, outline of duties at placement, and learning standards to be met and work-specific skills to be developed
- 90+ Placement hours, teacher monitoring, and student reflection; evaluation by the employer

#### **Curriculum Highlights**

- Connect personal strengths to possible work experience placements
- Identify employability skills and make a plan to develop them
- Demonstrate cultural sensitivity and workplace etiquette

#### **COVID Adaptations**

- WEX has been cancelled this year due to the fact that ALL our regular employer sponsors
  have declined to have volunteer students working at their sites due to COVID restrictions. (In
  any "normal" year our best source of placements is Royal Columbian Hospital)
- Fingers crossed, WEX will be fully back on track in the 2021-2022 school year



# **District Apprenticeship Programs**

Three programs run in co-operation with ITA sponsorship and financial assistance

- 1. Youth Explore Trades
- 2. TRAIN in Trades
- 3. WORK in Trades

#### **Potential ITA Funding**

- ➤\$100 per student for Youth Explore Trades Program
- >\$2200 per successfully completed TRAIN course
- >\$500 per Dual WORK/TRAIN students
- ➤\$30,000 Youth Work in Trades Support Grant

# Youth Explore Trades (YET)

#### **Youth Explore Trades** 10-12 (Elective)

- ➤ A "sampler" class that lets students explore construction careers as electricians, plumbers, framers, finish carpenters, dry wallers and more.
- ➤ Delivery is through lab work and can include community projects such as building sheds and garden systems.
- ➤ Students end up more informed about future career training interests and well prepared for the challenge of trades training.



## Youth TRAIN/WORK in Trades



#### **Youth TRAIN In Trades** (Apprenticeship)

Programs enable students to earn their first year of technical training while still in high school/recent graduate for dual credit

#### Youth WORK in Trades (4 courses/16 credits)

- ➤ Allows students to get up to 16 high school credits for work that they are already doing students can earn as they learn.
- Can occur before or after a TRAIN course. (but usually follows TRAIN)
- ➤ Students can earn a \$1000 Youth Work in Trades Award

## The Numbers 2020-2021

- > Approximately 43 students enrolled in Youth Explore Trades Skills
- > 29 onsite TRAIN students (Plumbing\*, Carpentry, Professional Cook)
- > 22 off-site TRAIN students (BCIT, KPU,VCC)

\*Plumbing numbers slightly down from last year due to COVID restrictions at PIC where students

complete the

program

### **WORK Awards 2020-**

- 2 Student must have successfully graduated
- Have completed all 4 WORK courses
- Maintained at least a C+ average
- Have completed 900+ hours of work

NWSS WORK students won 12 \$1000. ITA awards last year (out of about 18 students)



# Working towards the future

- Increase the number Youth Explore Trades Skills Construction to classes to 3 classes next year
- 2. Continue to grow enrollment in Apprenticeship Math 12 Pilot from 2 to 3 classes for next year (collaboration between Math and Apprenticeship Departments).
- 3. Continue to run full onsite TRAIN courses and increase the number of off-site seat purchases by 25% this year.
- Continue to grow WORK student portfolio as Youth Explore Trades Skills and TRAIN grow
- 5. Explore more dual credit options in human services at local post-secondary institutions

# **Trades Program Feedback**

I am currently enrolled in the CNC program at BCIT. In high school I found my love for design, and how I could develop and refine my designs using CAD programs. I fell in love with the class and I knew that I wanted to take my post secondary in the direction of computer aided design but with so many programs and schools I was feeling a bit lost and overwhelmed as I approached graduation. This is where Ms. McArthur came in. With my passion and aptitude for drafting she recommended I enroll in the CNC Tech program at BCIT. At first I wasn't sure, but I took the time to sit down with her as well as my drafting teacher and began to understand the advantage that working hands on making things is a vital part of becoming a good designer. Now, a few months into the program I couldn't be happier, I've discovered a whole new world that I never knew I enjoyed so much. I am so thankful that I had this opportunity brought and explained to me, because just reading about it on the BCIT site I would've glazed over it in a heartbeat and never found this new passion of mine.

## **Trades Program Feedback**

The trades program and help from a career coordinator has helped solidify my career path in carpentry. Ms McArthur has been a huge help in the process of starting up my career, getting associated with the Industry Trade Authority as a certified apprentice, helping with the signing up at BCIT for the Carpentry apprenticeship, and aiding me in making sure I can afford the program and have the necessary PPE. Ms. McArthur also helped me get the proper options for a job and used her variety of connections in the trades to give me work opportunities. Her help has made it easy for me and other students to follow their career path or discover a new one they were not even sure of. Without her help I would not have had such a good jump into the trades.
