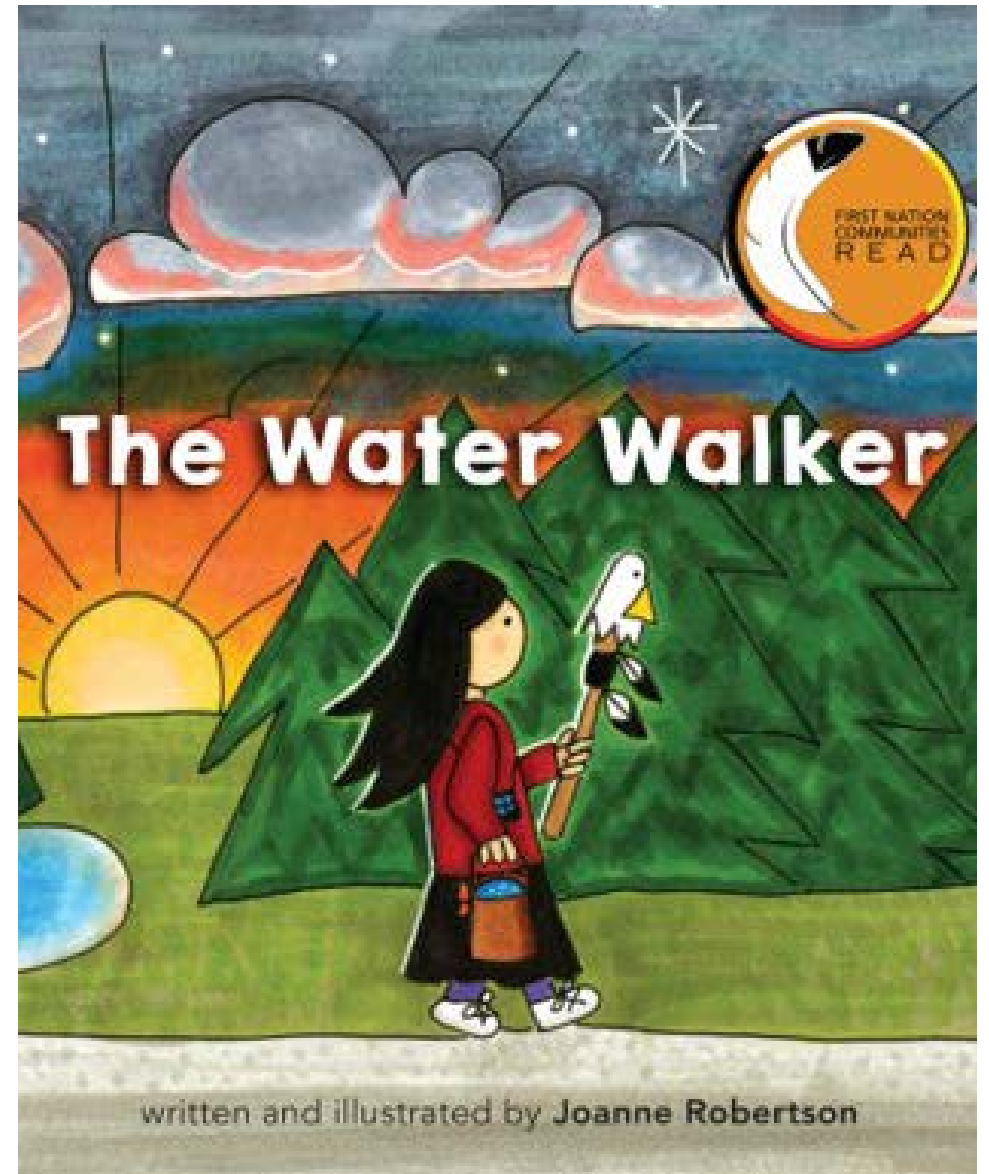
- Connecting to water – essential to all living things

The Water Walker

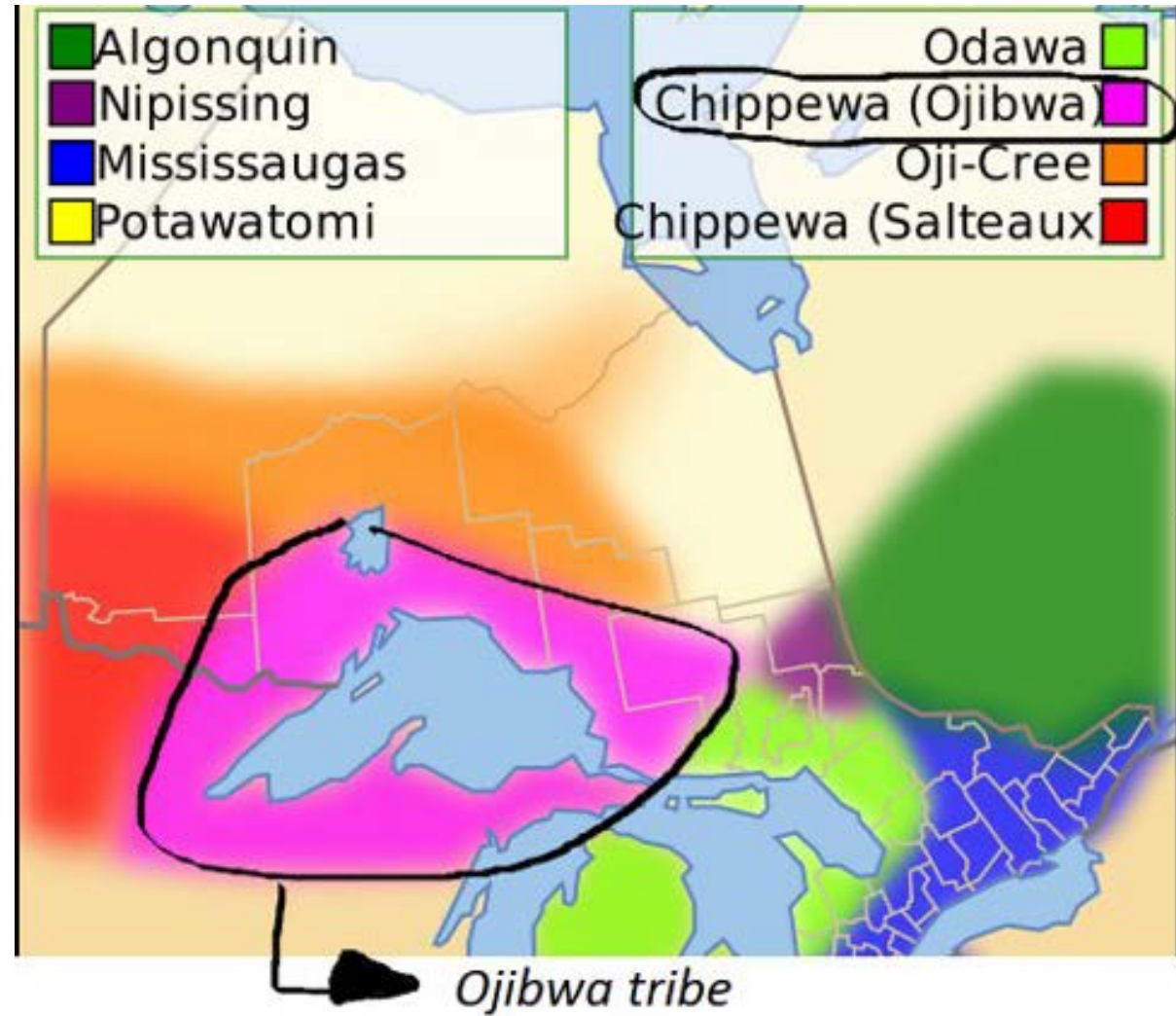
- True story that describes the Water Walks of an Anishinaabe grandmother, Josephine Mandamin around the Great Lakes – raising awareness for the need of water protection

- Turtle Island Pledges



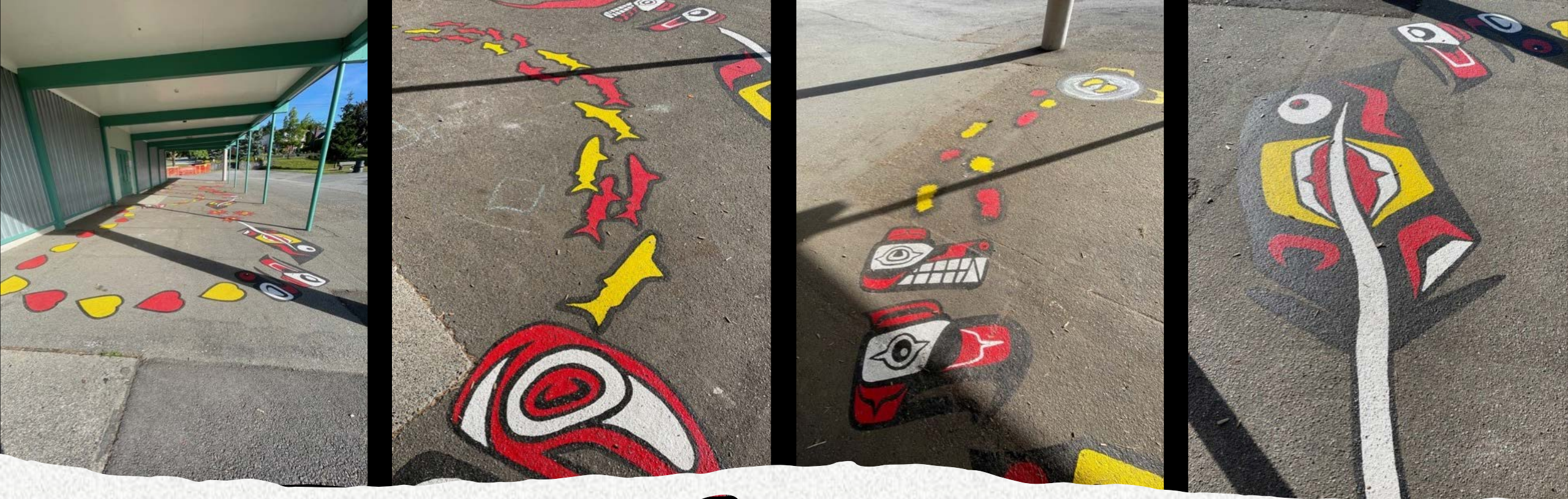
