

## Understanding 2SLGBTQ+ Students

 A 2021 Ipsos poll across 27 countries found that 4% of youth identify as transgender/non-binary/not male or female

NWSS = approximately **80 students**

Anyone is welcome to use this bathroom.


Give the facility a once-over before you exit and leave it clean. Consider the comfort of the person who enters after you. Remember to flush and wash your hands!

## Transition Plan June 8, 2022 Board Meeting

- Establish communication protocols and points of contact in the event of school emergencies, lockdowns, critical incidents and VTRAs (Violence Threat Risk Assessments)
- Establish protocols and training for emergency procedures
- Establish a process to request optional NWPD information sessions/presentations for students/staff
- Establish a referral process to the Gang Prevention Unit as necessary to support students who may be at risk of, or engaging in, gang activity








## Foods to Avoid

- Some packaged, processed snack foods
- Sweetened milk and sweetened plant based beverages
- Beverages containing sugar substitutes
- Commercially processed meats
- 100% fruit juice
- Cookies, cakes, and bars

Whole grain or whole wheat products over refined grains is suggested.

#### Step 2 Nutrition Criteria

The product must meet all three criteria to be offered, sold or served.
