## **Graduation - Mandatory Courses**

- To graduate, you require a minimum of 80 credits
- Each grade 10–12 course is worth 4 credits
- 52 credits are mandatory (13 courses)

English 10	English 11
Science 10	Science 11 or 12
Math 10	Math 11 or 12
Social Studies 10	Social Studies 11 or 12
Physical Education 10	English 12
Careers 10	Careers 12
Fine Arts or AD	ST 10, 11, or 12

- French Immersion Students must complete 12 more credits (3 courses) of Français Langue Seconde-Immersion courses taken in grades 10, 11, and 12
- Students must also complete one Indigenous-Focused English or Social Studies course to graduate

# **Graduation - Electives**

- 28 credits (7 courses) of the 80 required credits are electives
- An elective is any course other than the 13 mandatory courses required for graduation



- An elective can be an:
  - Academic course like an additional Science, English or Social Studies
  - Arts, ADST, Physical Education or Career-related course
- Electives may help you meet
   Post-Secondary requirements

# **Mandatory Assessments**

3 ASSESSMENTS are required for graduation

Literacy 10

Literacy 12

 French Immersion students must also complete the "Évaluation de littératie de la 12e année – Français langue seconde immersion"

- Assessments are graded on a scale of 1-4 (1=Lowest & 4 = highest)
- The assessment mark will not impact your English 10 or 12 final grade or your Math 10 final grade
- Currently, only UBC is considering the Literacy 12 assessment mark for admission - they want to see a 3 or 4

# Indigenous-Focused Graduation Requirement

All students working toward a B.C. Certificate of Graduation, must successfully complete at least 4 credits (one course) in Indigenous-focused coursework

If you didn't take English First Peoples (EFP) 10 this year, you can take EFP 11 next year, EFP 12 or BC First Peoples 12 (a Socials class) in grade 12








## What If I Do Not Pass A Course in Grade 10?

 If you do not pass a mandatory grade 10 course, you must redo it either online, in the summer, or next year

#### MANDATORY COURSES ARE:

- Math 10
- Science 10
- Socials Studies 10
- English 10
- Career Life Education 10
- Physical Education 10
- If you do not pass your language 10 course, you cannot do the language 11 course –you must redo the language 10 course first
- If you do not pass a course, you will not receive the credits for it



# Potential IB Students – Both Diploma and Course (Partial) Options

- If you are planning to do the IB program, either the full Diploma or the Course (Partial)
  program, you will fill out the course selection Microsoft Form with the courses you
  intend to take in IB.
- If/when you are accepted into the IB program, Mr. Korczyk, the IB Coordinator, will be in contact to further discuss your IB courses and plan for next year.



# Things to Consider for Course Selection



- It is important to choose your courses with your postsecondary plans in mind
- Consider your career goals what type of job do you want?
  - Does it require post-secondary education?

- Are you planning to go to university or college?
  - What courses do you need to take to be eligible?

If you are planning to do a Trade, such as Carpentry, Culinary, or Plumbing or a Dual-Credit University/College Program....

# DUAL CREDIT SFU SIAT CREATIVE TECHNOLOGY MICRO-CERTIFICATE

- These three dual-studies courses are open to Grade 12 students interested in exploring digital creativity
- You can apply to all or any of the courses, though all three would need to be completed to receive the Creative Technology Micro-Certificate
- These courses are offered by the School of Interactive Arts & Technology (SIAT) at SFU
- You have the potential to receive both high school and university credits
  - The credits are applicable at SFU or transferrable to other local university programs

# Considerations Related to Post-Secondary

- Post-Secondary Institutions (PSIs) will be looking at both your grade 11 & 12 marks when considering you for admission
- PSIs value a well-rounded course load
  - Take a mix of academics and electives
  - Take courses from various subject areas
- It is possible to attend college first and then transfer to university



- Evidence of school and community involvement and volunteer work reflects well on your applications
- Also, you need 30 hours of volunteer or paid work experience to graduate

# Considerations Related to Post-Secondary



- Keep up to date on post-secondary requirements for the program you want to attend
  - You must ensure that you meet the general university requirements <u>AND</u> program-specific requirements
  - SFU recommends 5 grade 12-level "approved" courses
  - UBC recommends 6 grade 12-level "approved" courses

#### NEW THIS YEAR

- As of September 2025, SFU no longer requires a language 11 for admission into any of their programs – however, UBC still requires it for September 2025 admission
- For students entering **UBC** in **September 2026**, a language 11 will not be required

# Step 1: Request Courses on Microsoft Forms



- At the end of this presentation, you will be able to begin the process of choosing your courses via a Microsoft Form
- The Microsoft Form replaces the paper course selection form we have used in years past
- The Form will be open until Feb 20
- The Microsoft Form (formerly the paper course selection form) is your counsellors copy of your course selections

# Step 2: Request Courses on MyEducation BC

- Choosing courses on MyEducation BC ensures that your courses have been entered into the scheduling system
- Skipping this step means that you have NOT actually requested any of your courses, which means that you may not get any of the courses you want next year
- Please ensure you have entered your courses by February 20






# **Entering Your Selections on My Ed**

The 6.3 major release is now available in Production COVID-19 Daily Health Check Website

1) Log into MyEducation account (<a href="https://myeducation.gov.bc.ca/aspen/home.do">https://myeducation.gov.bc.ca/aspen/home.do</a>)



3) Select "Requests" on the left-hand side tab. Make sure you are in Entry Mode.



4) Scroll to the bottom of the screen until you see the section "Primary requests"

## PLEASE NOTE...




- Your MyEducation BC course selections MUST match your course selections on the Microsoft Form
  - If you change your selections on your Microsoft Form, you MUST also change them on MyEducation BC
- Due to the school being extremely full, Please do NOT expect to be able to switch into courses next year that you didn't choose during the course selection process this year
- Indicating on your Microsoft Form that you want to take an online course does NOT mean that you are signed up for it
  - You must see your counsellor to officially enroll
